Hotel Information



Hotel Manu (3-star): Hotel MANU stands out as a spectacular presence among a host of high-rise urban cityscapes with flat structure and reminds us of a goblin's magic club that fulfills every dream of ours. In terms of its unique outer appearance, it safely deserves its title as the landmark of Seoul, but does not ignore even the details. The two asymmetrically protruded windows in every room offer a kaleidoscope of urban views according to the angles. Guests can look even the blind spots that, being covered by the gray buildings,

otherwise could have been unseen. Hotel MANU tells the tourists a special story that will remain in their memory.

- Seoul -



Seoul Museum of History: Seoul Museum of History captures the traditional culture of Seoul. Vestiges from the prehistoric era to modern Seoul are on display. The museum was renovated with modern updates in May 2002, 17 years after opening. The main exhibit halls are on the 3rd floor. Many of the Joseon Dynasty relics were donated during the Relic Donation Campaign. Also, the landscape of Seoul is recreated when it was the capital of the Joseon Dynasty. Another exhibit showcases the daily life of the Seoulites, while

another presents items through an online cyber museum. The 1st floor has many convenient facilities such as a coat check and the Kids Corner playroom.



Gyeongbokgung Palace: The largest of the five palaces constructed by the Joseon Dynasty. Joseon lasted for 500 years and laid the foundation for major aspects of Korean culture and identity, including the entrenchment of Confucian ideals and doctrines in Korean society, and the importation and adaptation of Chinese culture. Originally built in 1394, Gyeongbokgung translates as "Palace Greatly Blessed by Heaven," and it is an intense source of pride for Koreans, who have seen it ruined and rebuilt throughout the

centuries, most recently during Japanese occupation in the early 20th century. The current restoration project, whose aim is to return to palace to its 19th-century expansiveness, is about half complete now.



Insadong Antique Alley is famous for streets filled with the flavors of tradition and is universally well-loved by tourists. Here, foreigners can purchase traditional souvenirs at low prices and taste authentic dishes by stepping into a Korean restaurant found on every street corner.



Bukchon Hanok(Traditional Korean House) Village: Surrounded by Gyeongbokgung Palace, Changdeokgung Palace and Jongmyo Shrine, Bukchon Hanok Village is home to hundreds of traditional houses called 'hanok' that date back to the Joseon Dynasty. The name, 'Bukchon,' which literally translates to 'northern village,' came about as the neighborhoods that the village covers lie to the north of the two significant Seoul landmarks, Cheonggyecheon Stream and Jongno. Today, many of these hanoks operate as



cultural centers, guesthouses, restaurants and tea houses, providing an opportunity to experience, learn and immerse in Korean traditional culture.



Myeongdong Street: Myeong-dong is one of the most popular shopping districts in Seoul. The streets of Myeong-dong are always packed and full of life. Every nook and cranny is filled with places to eat and shop. Being centrally located in Seoul, Myeong-dong is the most popular, and a must-go destination for foreign visitors. From big-name stores like ZARA and Forever 21 to Hallyu paraphernalia; gourmet Korean restaurants to street foods - Myeong-dong has it all



Namdaemun Market: Opened in 1964, the Namdaemun Market is the largest traditional market in Korea with various goods in store. All products are sold at affordable prices and the sotres in this area also function as a wholesale market. Most of the goods are made directly by the sotreowners. When day breaks, the site of busy Koreans bustling around the market, creates a unique scene that attracts tourists worldwide. The Namdaemun Market sells a variety of clothes, glasses, kitchenware, toys, mountain gear, flowers, ginseng, and imported goods.



The War Memorial of Korea: The grounds of the War Memorial of Korea were once the headquarters of the Korean Infantry. Many experts from different fields were consulted numerous times and exhaustive research was done in order to complete the exhibits. This memorial is the largest of its kind in the world.



Itaewon Street: Itaewon is a unique place in Seoul where one can meet people of diverse nationalities and cultures. There is a popular joke saying that international residents may not know Seoul, but they know Itaewon. Seoul even designated Itaewon as its first 'Special Tourism District,' to highlight it as a destination for internationals to enjoy a diversity of culture, shopping, and entertainment experiences.



Samsung d'light: Located within the Samsung Electronics building in Seocho-dong, Seoul, 'Samsung d'light' is a global exhibition space that showcases the latest product lineup by Samsung Electronics. The three-storied exhibition space is not merely a display of electronic products, but a space of interaction that allows visitors to experience new life patterns through state-of-the-art digital technology categorized by theme.



COEX Mall: COEX Mall is the largest underground shopping center in Asia. It is located in the basement of the Korea World Trade Center, located in Samseong-dong in the Gangnam-gu area of Seoul. The colossal shopping center stretches from Samseong station (subway line 2) in the south all the way to Bongeunsa temple in the north, and is considered to be the best shopping and entertainment complex in the area.



Dongdaemun Design Plaza: The Dongdaemun Design Plaza (DDP) has been designed s a cultural hub at the centre of Dongdaemun, an historical district of Seoul that is now renowned for its 24-hour shopping and cafes. DDP is a place for people of all ages; a catalyst for the instigation and exchange of ideas and for new technologies and media to be explored. The variety of public spaces within DDP includes Art/Exhibition Halls, Conference Hall, Design Museum/Exhibition Hall/Pathway, Design Labs & Academy Hall, Media Centre.







K-POP Hologram Concert "K-LIVE": K-live is the world's first dedicated K-pop hologram performance hall. Combining Korea's top K-pop contents and digital technologies, K-live provides new things to see and fantastic experiences. The vivid sense of reality given by high-resolution images, and the grandeur of a 270 degree panorama view that fills your field of vision, combined with the dance performances of popular idol groups and the cheer of

K-pop creates an experience of unrivaled joy. The K-live theater is located in the imaginary "Hallyu City." The Middle Age-themed pavement blocks, streetlamps here and there, the dusky atmosphere with the stars glittering far in the distance make for a dreamlike atmosphere.



Dongdaemun Night Market: Seoul has numerous popular shopping locations such as Myeong-dong, Ehwa University, and Itaewon. However, Korea's most well known and probably best shopping location is Dongdaemun, which is packed with eager shoppers browsing the wholesale and retail malls and street stalls. At Dongdaemun Market there is a huge selection of merchandise available at affordable prices, and the shops stay open until dawn allowing customers to really shop until they drop!

Tourist Attraction Information

- Paju -



Dora Observatory: Situated in Paju and at the northernmost point of the Military Demarcation Line of the Western Front, the Dora Observatory replaced the previous Songaksan Observation Post which was closed. From the observatory, visitors can overlook North Korea and its various locations including Gaeseong, Songaksan, Kim II-Sung Statue, and Cooperation Farm.



The 3rd tunnel: The 3rd Tunnel was discovered on October 17, 1978. It is located 52km from Seoul. It was estimated that it took approximately an hour for 10,000 soldiers to move through the tunnel. When this tunnel was first discovered, North Koreans insisted it was made by South Koreans in a plot to invade North Korea. However, this theory proved eventually to be false. Dorasan Observatory is located nearby the 3rd Tunnel. From this observation platform, North Korean military personnel are visible, and so are the highlights of Gaeseong and the Geumgangsan Diamond Mountains.
